1984-85 Courses of Study Topic of Meetings Next Week

The calendar year, 1984, has just begun but staff members, parents and students in sixth through eleventh grades are considering courses of study for the 1984-1985 academic year.

Meetings for parents will be held next week. Parents of present ninth grade students will have the opportunity to discuss the high school program of studies for tenth through twelfth grades at a special meeting at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, at the high school.

Robert G. Petix, WHS principal, will describe typical programs, requirements for the year and for graduation, and discuss the differences in school routine between the junior high school and the high school.

Specific questions concerning courses will be answered. Course outlines will be available. The program on Tuesday is specifically designed for parents who will have children in the senior high school for the first time in

September, 1984; however, it is open to all interested members of the community.

Parents of students in sixth through eighth grades will have the opportunity to discuss the seventh through ninth grade program of studies meetings scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 9, at 8 p.m. in the two junior high schools - Edison Junior High School and Roosevelt Junior High School.

Eugene Voll, principal of RJHS, and Samuel Hazell, principal of EJHS, will discuss typical programs of study, requirements and discuss the differences in school routine between the elementary schools and the junior high schools, particularly for parents of students currently in the sixth grade.

Several course changes, recently approved by the Board of Education, will be discussed and questions answered about specific courses and courses sequences.

"Continued from page one" report in the spring of 1980 that, in order to serve Westfield adequately, a facility about twice the size of the existing one is needed. Alternative solutions presented by the professional firm ranged from a modest expansion at the Municipal Building to construction of an entirely new building at a new site. Subsequent to the Fry report, a citizens' advisory board was appointed by the library's board of trustees to reinvestigate the library's needs and it also found the current facilities lacking. The committee deemed that a minimum of 12,500 additional square feet of space is needed.

The board of trustees responded by studying in detail two possible solutions felt to be most feasible of those suggested by the Fry report: Utilization of the Grant School site and expansion of current space. Since the citizens' group expressed in an 80 percent majority decision a preference for on-site expansion, three architects were engaged. Their four concepts, displayed to the public, were rejected by the board of trustees in April of 1982.

Vincentsen and Harvey Wolfson. To date, none of the incumbents have announced whether or not they will seek re-election. Citizens interested in running for the school board for a three year term of office may obtain a nominating petition from the board's business office at 302 Elm St., any week day between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Nominating petitions must be signed by ten residents and they must be filed with the board secretary, Samuel Soprano, by 4 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 23. Also the candidate must sign the petition in the presence of a witness.

School board candidates must be able to read and write, they must be a resident in the school district for at least two years and they should have no interest in any claim against the school board.

Some of the duties of the school board are policy making, appointing school personnel, approving textbooks and supplemental instructional materials, setting salary schedules, approving curriculum, approving a school budget for presentation to the public at the polls, planning and approving the school building program and setting up a school calendar.

parents assigned to telephone parents to let them know when school is cancelled.

If school is cancelled, the school day must be made up at the end of the school year so that students will have the state-required 180 days of instruction, so far this year, only one day has been declared a "no school" or "snow day." That day will have to be made up at the end of the year. Thus, students will have to attend classes on Wednesday, June 20 which is the 180th day of school. If more "snow days" are needed, they will have to be made up, beginning June 21.

If school is scheduled for a "delayed opening," it means that all schools will begin at 10 a.m. When school has a "delayed opening," the day counts as a day of instruction and does not have to be made up at the end of the school year. So far this year, there have been two days with "delayed openings."

Dr. William D. Hollstein

Dr. William D. Hollstein of Westfield, an osteopathic physician practicing in Westfield for 45 years, died at his home Saturday. He had suffered a severe stroke Oct. 20.
