First Presbyterian Youth Prepare Service Project

WESTFIELD — The Youth Commission of The Presbyterian Church in Westfield will hold a mission trip to the Dominican Republic from Friday, June 25, to Friday, July 2, to rebuild a school destroyed by Hurricane Georges last year.

The Reverend Christina McCormick, Associate Pastor for Youth, who has organized the project, stated, "This church has a long tradition of sending high school students every year on a week-long mission project."

"These trips are wonderful opportunities for the young people of our church to draw closer to God and to each other by serving others," she stated. "It is also a chance to broaden their perspective of the world in which we live by living a week in a situation much different from their own."

The mission will be funded by a Youth Stock Sale. The proceeds from the sale of the stock, at \$10 per share, will go toward financing the trip and other projects conducted during the year.

The cost of the trip to the Domini-

can Republic will be about \$1,000 per student.

"We are asking that everyone do more than in previous years. We are asking our young people to work harder to raise money for themselves. We are also asking their parents to pay more," stated Ms. McCormick.

The students also seek support from businesses and individuals in the Westfield area.

"We feel that in every way and for every dollar given, what we will receive as a youth group, and as a congregation, will be absolutely obvious and worth it," she stated.
